

### **CARING FOR GOD'S CREATION**

I was somewhat bemused to see pictures of Boris Johnson arriving in Cornwall on a private jet plane for the recent G7 summit. Bemused because as he emerged from the plane he was talking about building back better, fairer and greener following the Covid pandemic. There are surely greener ways to travel from London to Cornwall than by plane. Our actions often speak louder than our words. It can be a real challenge to change the way we do things to ensure we are caring for the world around us.

In the Parish we set aside the 26th-27th June as a Climate Change weekend — an opportunity to think about the way we live and the effect it has on the environment. I am writing this article before the weekend, but I fully expect you to be reading it after it has happened.



One of the messages I know the team were hoping to get across was that everything we do – no matter how small – can make a difference. Part of the Sunday service was for each of us to fill in a pledge card to do one more thing to help the environment. I hope you were able to make such a pledge – why not tell us all about it and how you are getting on by writing something for the magazine. I hope as well that you found the service – and all the displays that were around St James over the weekend – helpful and interesting.

The environment is a focus of much of what we are doing in the Parish at the moment and caring for the creation is one of our priorities. The work that the dedicated team do week by week in the St James Churchyard; the bird feeding and wild area at St John's; the launch of Forest Church – read elsewhere in the magazine about how Jean Wall experienced this; the nature count identifying the huge variety of species of grass, flower, lichen, insects and more in the Churchyard; the return of Messy Church

in person on June 19th taking a look at how we care for the world; and of course the Climate Change weekend with its displays and challenges.

All of these activities are ways that help us look after the wonderful world that God has created. He has given us the responsibility of caring for his creation – may this be reflected not just in what we say but also in what we do.

We will be celebrating three things in a Parish Service at St James Church on Sunday 25th July at 10.30am.

### WHAT IS FOREST CHURCH?

I had heard this question many times over the previous few weeks but on May 30th we found out.

It is worshipping God in the open air, surrounded by the beauty of His Creation, in spite of being so near a huge city.

At St John's the church is surrounded by a wide variety of trees - all different shapes, sizes and colours. My ever-fertile imagination felt that we were in a clearing in part of a forest. That imagination could not stretch to Tilehouse Lane being a babbling brook – more like a rushing torrent as the traffic sped past, but the intervals of quiet allowed us to hear the birds singing before they went to roost for the night.

We were encouraged to walk around the grounds, feel the trees, the bark, the leaves, the grass and to take in the smells of the open air. We even had the chance to hug a tree, if that brought us nearer to its strength.

During the year we had to have some trees cut back and we found logs that showed the growth rings of the tree, from which experts can work out the history of the tree, during good and poor growing conditions. We were given a print of a similar cut surface and invited to map out our own "growth" through



good times and not so good times. Quite a challenging exercise – finished off at home. Don't be put off, it was an interesting thing to do.

Finally, we offered our prayers, turning to the four points of the compass, giving our thanks and praise for the beauty surrounding us. It was also good to praise Him in song as we were outside.



We were so lucky with the weather – it was perfect and the introduction of "Forest Church" was so special – why not find out for yourself by joining us on **August 29th** in St James Churchyard (whatever the weather) and share the beauty of God's Creation.

**FOOD BANK**: sadly, the numbers of clients are expected to rise during the summer school holidays. If you are in a position to help, dried milk, UHT orange juice and instant mash would be very welcome - but please NO cereals or pasta!

**CLOTHING BANK** at the Narthex: Sandra and her team cannot know from one day to the next what will be needed. If a destitute family with six children applies for clothing, her supplies for a particular age can be wiped out. And that's when



I put an appeal in the weekly Pew Slip knowing that you will respond quickly if you are able. The appeal for children's shoes was an example - a wonderful response - many thanks. At the moment the appeal is for men's new underwear, small and medium sizes.

A huge 'Thank You' to all the folks who cleared out their airing cupboards during Lockdown and donated surplus bedding and curtains. Most of it went to Sparkhill Narthex but I was also able to send a carload to Spring House, a charity specialising in homeless folks. NOTHING GOES TO WASTE IN THIS HOUSE!!

**ADAVU**: this started in 2011 as a project of Birmingham Methodist District. The founders had set up the Regional Anti-Trafficking network in 2008. They soon realised that there was a huge lack of long-term support for survivors. By 2014 they were having at least five enquiries per month from agencies and community groups who wanted advice about the right type of support for each survivor and from this evolved the current set up which we support through the toiletries and Christmas appeals (plus the occasional Emergency Appeal, such as the recent request for new-born baby prams). There are two experienced Support Workers plus Liisa as the skilled Project Manager to help thirty women (usually women) rescued from trafficking in the West Midlands. Plus, a volunteer Befriending Scheme.



Already we have been alerted to the Christmas Party date (December 16th 2021) - a gentle alert to my wonderful/talented team of volunteers who supply over 300 cakes for the dessert and take home treats ...

In the meantime, I am always on the scrounge for toiletries (basic is fine) which Sarah Penfold is happy to receive.

Last Christmas the adults loved the toiletry bags but for the children especially the boys it was the torches and the small, knitted dinosaurs which turned out to be the great success.



If anyone knows the identity of the knitter of the dinosaurs, please ask her/him to contact me. Or if anyone else would like to have a go ... it's very challenging to find low cost presents which excite small boys.

### P-R-A-Y

'Look to the LORD and his strength; seek his face always.' 1 Chronicles 16:11 NIV

To help you remember the four parts of prayer, think of the acrostic P-R-A-Y:

- **P** Praise the Lord! Not sure how? Think you'll run out of words? Not if you use the Scriptures. David gives us a beautiful example in 1 Chronicles 29:11-13. It's one you can use: 'Yours, Lord, is the greatness and the power and the glory and the majesty and the splendour...Yours, Lord, is the kingdom...In your hands are strength and power to exalt and give strength to all. Now, our God, we give you thanks, and praise your glorious name' (NIVUK).
- **R** Repent of your sins! Just as heat forces impurities to the surface so the metal refiner can remove them, your prayer time will reveal attitudes that must be changed, habits that must be broken, and barriers to blessing that must be removed. It's not enough to tell God about your sins. He already knows them. You must ask Him to help you turn away from them. This is true repentance.
- A Ask for yourself and others! Your prayers invite God into the situation, and your faith activates His power to change it. There's no distance in prayer, no culture or language barrier it can't overcome. It's like throwing on a power switch things begin to move when we pray. Jesus said, 'I will give you the keys of the Kingdom of Heaven...whatever doors you open on earth shall be open in heaven' (Matthew 16:19 TLB).
- **Y** Yield yourself to God's will! Declaring the Lordship of Jesus Christ in your life is like signing your name to the bottom of a blank cheque and inviting Him to fill in the amount.

It's where we are meant to be.


So find a place

### **GREEN REFLECTIONS**



Green Reflections: biblical inspiration for sustainable living
By Martin Hodson and Margot Hodson

How should we look after the world we inhabit? This book combines scientific and theological wisdom to offer 62 reflections inspired by passages from the Bible in a thoughtful exploration that encourages both reflection and response. Themes include The Wisdom of Trees, Landscapes of Promise and Sharing Resources.

### THE SPACES BETWEEN

Most of us have been in situations where we are not in control, and we don't know how to feel or how to react to our situation. We need help.

The most valuable gift you can have at those times – is time itself. Time to be 'listened to'. Really listened to. But it is not easy to find someone who will 'actively listen' to you.

Think of the last time you were in the reverse position with a friend or a colleague, and they were talking to you. How easily do you recall what they actually said? Most of us are so busy getting our replies ready for when the person has finished speaking, that we don't clearly hear their punch line.

With God it is different. We can take everything to Him; all our worries and cares and failures and faults. And He listens.

He doesn't necessarily jump in with an instant, easy solution, but rather He promises to always guide us, if we ask Him, through life's challenges, and He promises to never leave us. He often speaks to us through his written word, the Bible.

This last year, when many of us have been communicating with others by phone or Zoom, we get nervous if it all goes quiet. We feel the need to 'nudge' the other person, to make sure they are still there. Silence is not a natural state for many of us – and yet it is in the quiet we can hear ourselves and God most clearly.


So, when we talk with God, our conversation should not be rushed and one-sided. We need to give space to our silence before Him, to wait and listen for Him to speak to us.

### This month:

Next time you worship in church, listen to the silences: the spaces between the words, the music and the actions. Listen to all the prayers that are spoken.

Look at your surroundings and reflect that they have absorbed thousands of prayers – and holy silence – down the centuries of their existence.

Look out the window and see the vastness of the sky above you – and let your prayers join with those that have gone before you. May the knowledge that you are not alone encourage and strengthen you.



### **TIME FOR A CHANGE**

I have had my walking boots for a few years now, and they have been faithful companions. We have walked many miles together during that time, on my daily walks as well as on holiday. They are partly responsible for my physical recovery after Covid-19, so they have a place in my heart. They fit me very well, and we have adjusted to one another. But they are very thin now on the soles and heels, and it is reluctantly time for a change.

So, one recent Saturday I bought a new pair. They are clean and smart, and fully waterproof. The soles are strong and new. There are no signs of wear and tear. But I know that change is never easy. They will take some time to wear in. They may rub and I may get a blister or two. Occasionally I will long for my old boots, and wonder, 'Did I make a mistake?' Hopefully, they will become as much a part of me as my old ones as we tread the miles together. But there is always a risk with something new, Isn't there?







### **SHIRLEY PARISH BOOK CLUB**

### 'From healthy eating to a fish and chip supper'

Our most recent read was Afternoon Tea at the Sunflower Café by Milly Johnson and this comparison in the title between healthy eating and fish and chip suppers is how one of our members described her experience of the novel. She (Margaret J) thinks that while most of our Book Club choices make us think, others are more about entertainment than challenge. The Milly Johnson novel fits into the fast food category. Easy to get into, not hard work and once you start reading you're there.



Ursula calls the novel, 'a quick easy holiday read - not much thought needed. I found it difficult to like the characters at the start and then found the ending just too cliched and predictable. Downtrodden wife gets own back on cheating husband and finds true love in the process; cheating husband realises he loves his wife too late and tries to make a new start once he has lost all; good girl loses all her money then inherits an unexpected fortune, saves the day and finds a new love; spinster with unrequited love for the cheating husband gets vicious revenge. The most interesting character I found was Astrid, but the ending does leave one question - what became of Ivanka after the cheating husband dumped her? Sorry, not a brilliant review but that is how I read it and life would be dull if we all liked the same books.'

Pat found this novel 'grating ... readable and straightforward but a sad reflection of our society'. Sarah felt that she would never have picked this book in a shop or a library - the title and cover picture gave it an air of Mills and Boon but concluded that the novel 'turned out to be a story of women working together to take control of their lives in the face of lousy men. Luckily not all the men are lousy, and the scones are rather good.'

Like many of us, Jill found a good deal to enjoy in the novel and it turns out that Sue G has read several Milly Johnson novels already and has found that 'her books are very readable, with humour and pathos. I think she writes female characters better than male, and although the stories usually end up happily and problems are resolved, they are not "fairy stories". One of the pleasures of her books are the locations she features which are where we once lived so are familiar and recognizable (even though she changes some names).'


Meryl found the novel, 'short and sweet ... a really enjoyable read. Entertaining, funny, loved the descriptions of the characters and their voices. A good pace to the plot with lots of different back stories to make up a whole. It was nice to read something that wasn't about death and heart searching messages. A pleasant distraction.'

And Sue H found it an easy, relaxing read. 'The characters were a bit stereotypical I thought, but the plot moved along smoothly, a bit like a soap opera on television. I found the latter part of the book the best bit. It was quite an entertaining read.'

In short, no one was offended, and everyone was entertained.

Having heard that the recent winner of the Waterstone's Scottish Fiction Ward, Sarah Maine, is gathering quite a following among our members we are suggesting that our group embark on either, *The House Between Tides* (if they haven't already experienced this wonderful novel) or, if they have, to try a second Sarah Maine novel, *Women of the Dunes*.

### **WORDSEARCH - DOUBTING THOMAS**

If you have ever doubted aspects of your Christian faith, St Thomas is the saint for you. His feast day is on 3rd July.

Thomas, one of Jesus' twelve disciples, was deeply devoted, but also very honest whenever he got confused. When Jesus spoke of going to his Father (John 14), Thomas was not afraid to ask Him where His Father was. As for the Resurrection, that really baffled Thomas. He demanded to see the risen Jesus for himself - and touch the wounds in His hands and feet. When Jesus appeared, Thomas' immediate response was one of worship: "My Lord and my God" (John 20).

Thus, Doubting Thomas' honest doubts, turned to honest faith, have become a reassurance for thousands of us down the centuries who also sometimes doubt Jesus. In Doubting Thomas' complete affirmation of faith, after meeting the risen, crucified Christ, we can find support for our own faith in Him.


